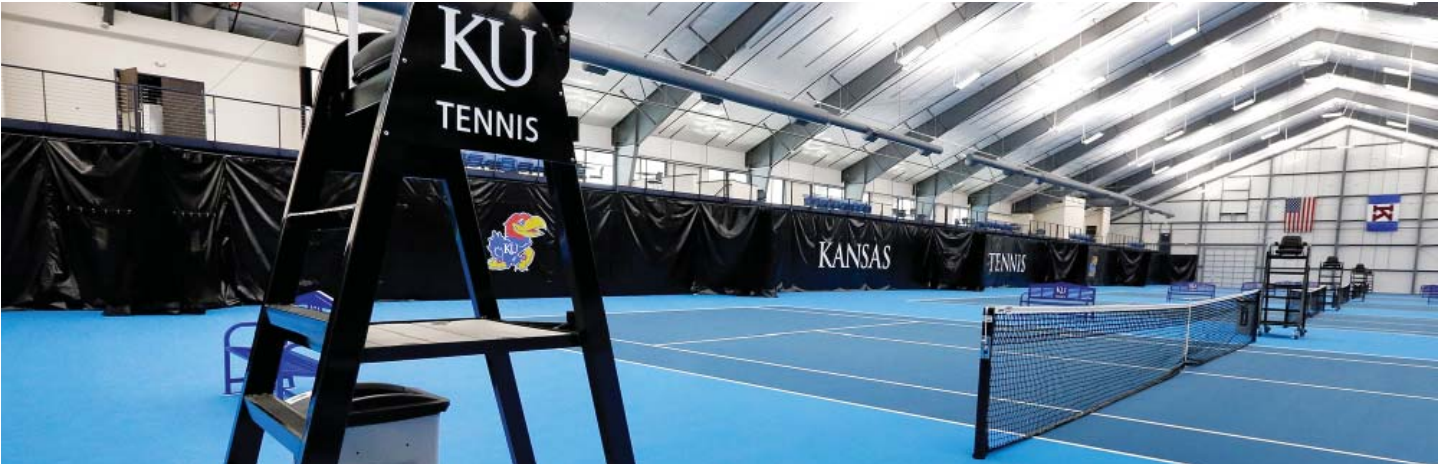

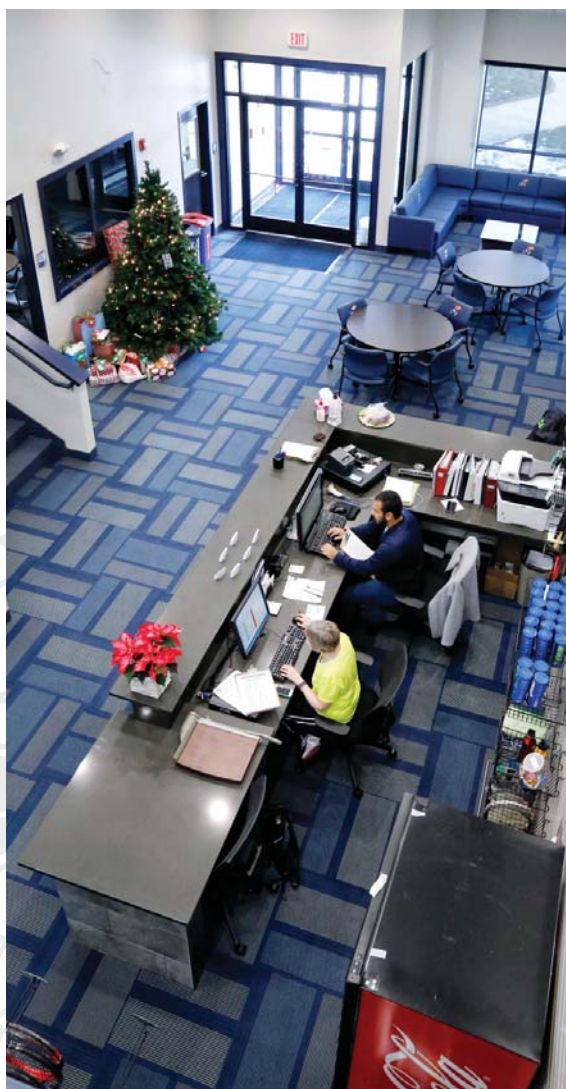

ACADEMICS

The Student-Athlete Support Services staff focuses all collective resources in support of the academic, personal and interpersonal development of each individual it serves. As part of its commitment to the academic success of its athletes, Kansas Athletics completed a new academic complex in the summer of 2009. The facility features individual study rooms, a computer lab and offices for all Student-Athlete Support Services personnel.

KANSAS ATHLETICS TUTORING PROGRAM

- Tutoring is available to any student-athlete who needs academic assistance.
- Approximately 120 tutors work for Kansas Athletics, many of whom are instructors or teaching assistants at KU or retired educators. Some tutors are undergraduate students who have excelled in their respective subject areas.
- Kansas Athletics offers both individualized and small study group tutoring, based entirely upon the learning needs of each student-athlete.
- Nearly 2,000 tutoring sessions are scheduled each week.
- More than 300 student-athletes work with tutors each semester.

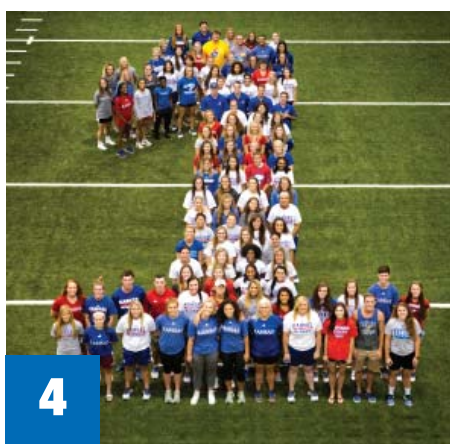

1. FRESHMAN LEADERSHIP ACADEMY

To develop committed leaders who represent the University of Kansas and its intercollegiate athletic programs with pride, integrity and intense competitive spirit.

2. EMERGENT LEADER RETREATS

Student-athletes, selected by their coaches, attend an overnight Jayhawk Leadership Retreat twice a year. They participate in activities, exercises and discussions designed to enhance leadership skills from a strengths-based perspective.

3. CAREER DEVELOPMENT

A career development progression; beginning with a career interest inventory, resume review, career coaching, mock interviews, utilizing KU Career Connections and Kansas Athletics' Career Fair.

4. STUDENT-ATHLETE ADVISORY COMMITTEE

SAAC's mission is to enhance the total student-athlete experience, protect student-athlete welfare and promote a positive student-athlete image. Around 50 student-athletes serves as SAAC members

5. COMMUNITY SERVICE

Developing leaders off the field by fostering an environment in which the student-athletes understand and value the benefits of giving back to their community.

6. JAYHAWKS AFTER COLLEGE

Kansas Athletics Career Development and K Club have teamed up to assist student-athletes who have exhausted athletic eligibility, but are finishing up academic responsibilities while transitioning into life after college.

Athletic Department Success

1. BASEBALL

Team: Five NCAA Tournament appearances, most recent in 2014; Three players drafted in 2017: Matt McLaughlin, Stephen Villines and Blake Weiman.

Ritch Price: Became KU's all-time winningest coach on March 4, 2017, and holds that mark at 465 victories; **Stephen Villines:** The Jayhawks' career saves leader (40) was named to the All-Big 12 First Team; **James Cosentino:** All-Big 12 Second Team and *Collegiate Baseball* Freshman All-American.

2. MEN'S BASKETBALL

Team: 14th 30-win season (33-5); Won its NCAA-record-tying 13th-consecutive Big 12 title and added to its NCAA-record 60th overall conference regular-season championship; Entered the 2017 NCAA Tournament as a No. 1 seed and advanced to the Elite Eight for the second year in a row.

Bill Self: The ninth-fastest coach in NCAA history to reach 600 career wins, including 400 at Kansas, and part of the Class of 2017 for induction into the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame; **Frank Mason III:** National Player of the Year by 10 different organizations, Big 12 Player of the Year and Bob Cousy Point Guard of the Year; **Josh Jackson:** All-Big 12 First Team and a Wooden All-American; **Devonte' Graham:** All-Big 12 Second Team, 59th player in KU history to score 1,000 points.

3. WOMEN'S BASKETBALL

Jessica Washington: First Jayhawk to earn Big 12 Newcomer of the Year honors.

4. FOOTBALL

Team: 11 players currently on NFL rosters, including a trio of Pro Bowlers in Chris Harris Jr., Darrell Stuckey and Aqib Talib.

David Beaty: Led KU to its first win over Texas in 78 years with a 24-21 overtime victory in 2016; **Dorance Armstrong Jr.:** Became Kansas' first unanimous All-Big 12 First Team selection – as he was one of 11 Jayhawks honored in 2016.

5. MEN'S GOLF

Team: Back-to-back NCAA Regional appearances in 2016 & 2017; Five honored with Academic All-Big 12 recognition.

Chase Hanna: First Big 12 champion, All-Big 12 First Team, PING All-Regional Central Team, Big 12 All-Tournament Team, Set school record with 10-under-par 61 at Ka'anapali Collegiate Classic; **Daniel Sutton:** Big 12 All-Tournament Team.

6. WOMEN'S GOLF

Team: Jayhawks have had representation either as the team or individuals at three of the last four NCAA Regionals.

Yi-Tsen Chou: Tied for ninth to become the first Kansas freshman to finish in the top-10 at the Big 12 Championship since the 2013 event, Posted the highest finish by a KU freshman since the 2004 championship, As a result, Chou was named the All-Big 12 Tournament Team.

7. ROWING

Team: 22 Jayhawks on the 2017 Academic All-Big 12 Rowing Team; Fourth-place finish at 2017 Big 12 Championship; Three-straight Dillons Sunflower Showdown victories; Two 2017 Big 12 Boat of the Week honors.

Kaelyn Thierolf: Two-time All-Big 12 honoree.

8. SOCCER

Team: Made seventh NCAA Tournament appearance in 2016; Finished second in the Big 12; Six players named to All-Big 12 teams; Notched double-digit victories in 12 of head coach Mark Francis' 18 seasons.

Mark Francis: One win shy of his 200th victory at Kansas; **Grace Hagan:** All-Big 12 and All-Region First Teams; **Katie McClure:** Big 12 All-Freshman Team; **Taylor Estrada:** Finished career with eighth-most starts in KU history (80).

9. SOFTBALL

Team: Increased its streak to eight-straight seasons under head coach Megan Smith with a win over a nationally-ranked opponent after defeating then-No. 14 Baylor at Rock Chalk Park in March.

Harli Ridling: All-Big 12 Second Team and NFCA All-Region; **Erin McGinley:** NFCA All-Region.

10. SWIMMING & DIVING

Team: Scored a program-best 683.5 points at the Big 12 Championship to finish second.

Madison Straight, Peri Charapich and Haley Downey each earned All-Big 12 First Team honors.

11. TENNIS

Team: Earned a berth to the NCAA Championships in each of the last two seasons, marking the first back-to-back trips since 1998 & 1999.

Anastasiya Rychagova: 2016 and 2017 All-Big 12 Singles First Team; **Tess Bernard-Feigenbaum:** Big 12 Newcomer of the Year, All-Big 12 Doubles Second Team; **Nina Khmelnitckaia:** All-Big 12 Doubles Second Team; **Bernard-Feigenbaum & Khmelnitckaia:** At-large berth to the NCAA Doubles Championship, a first for KU since 1998, defeated No. 2 overall seed.

12. MEN'S TRACK & FIELD

Team: 11th at the 2017 NCAA Outdoor Championships; Runner-up at the 2016 outdoor, 2017 indoor and 2017 outdoor Big 12 Championships; Ranked as high as sixth in the USTFCCA weekly rankings in 2017.

Stanley Redwine: 2017 Midwest Region Men's Head Coach of the Year, 2016 Big 12 Outdoor Men's Head Coach of the Year; **Mitch Cooper:** First Team All-American (discus), Two-time Big 12 Champion (discus); **Hussain Al Hizam:** First Team All-American (pole vault), 2017 Big 12 Champion (pole vault); **Gleb Dudarev:** Bronze medalist at the 2017 NCAA Outdoor Championships (hammer throw), 2017 Big 12 Champion (hammer throw).

13. WOMEN'S TRACK & FIELD

Team: 2013 NCAA Outdoor National Champion; Finished in the top-25 at the NCAA Outdoor National Championships five times in the last 10 years.

Sharon Lokedi: Two-time First Team All-American (10,000m), Claimed Big 12 titles in both the 5,000m and 10,000m in 2017, Named 2017 Big 12 Outstanding Female Performer; **Sydney Conley:** Three-time First Team All-American (long jump), Two-time Big 12 Champion (long jump).

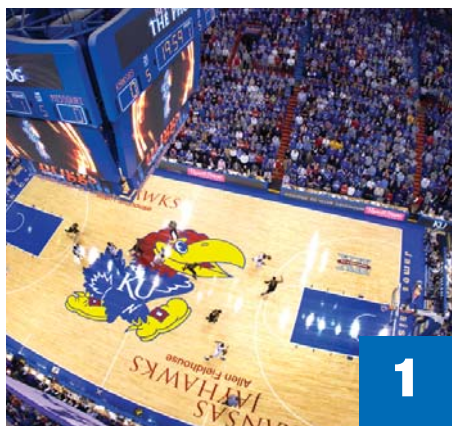
14. VOLLEYBALL

Team: 2016 Big 12 Champions; 2015 NCAA Championship Semifinalists; 57-6 record in the last two seasons, including a 28-2 mark at home.

Ray Bechard: Four-time Big 12 Coach of the Year; **Kelsie Payne:** Two-time First Team All-American, 2016 Big 12 Player of the Year; **Ainise Havili:** Three-time All-American, Back-to-back Big 12 Setter of the Year; **Madison Rigdon:** All-American; **Cassie Wait:** KC Sports Commission Sportswoman of the Year, All-American, Big 12 VB Scholar-Athlete of the Year, 2016 Big 12 Libero of the Year; **Taylor Soucie:** Big 12 Gauff Postgraduate Scholar, Winner of KU's Marlene Mawson Exemplary Student-Athlete Award.

1. ALLEN FIELDHOUSE

Allen Fieldhouse is labeled by many as one of the best places in America to watch a college basketball game; Hosts approximately 35 home basketball games (men and women combined) each year; Largest basketball arena in the state of Kansas and the second largest in the Big 12 Conference

2. ANDERSON FAMILY FOOTBALL COMPLEX

Completed in July 2008, now the headquarters of Kansas football; Adjacent to Memorial Stadium, the two-level building includes offices, academic areas, a weight room, locker rooms, an audio-visual room, meeting rooms, a cardio room, a hydro-therapy room, a nutrition area and a display area; The stand-alone, 80,000 square-foot facility is the state-of-the-art centerpiece of a \$33 million project, which also includes two practice fields and additional parking

3. ANDERSON STRENGTH CENTER

State-of-the-art weight room that helps KU compete with other universities for top student-athletes; \$8 million, 42,000-square-foot complex

4. ANSCHUTZ PAVILLION

Indoor practice facility for many Jayhawk teams; 40,000-square-foot multi-purpose building; Renovated in August of 2011 and features a new turf surface

5. ARROCHA BALLPARK AT ROCK CHALK PARK

Home of Kansas softball; 2015 was the first season at the current location, Arrocha Ballpark was originally located south of Allen Fieldhouse, but the name transferred to honor the \$2 million gift by Cheryl Womack in November 2002

6. THE JAYHAWK CLUB

Considered “home” to the University of Kansas men’s and women’s golf programs; With a state-of-the-art practice facility and 36 of the finest-kept golf holes in Kansas, the teams are able to challenge themselves on a daily basis; The Knapheide Family Practice Facility consists of four climate-controlled hitting bays with cutting-edge swing technology; Three smaller bays in addition to one larger bay, which is equipped with a V1 video swing analysis system and a Trackman radar launch monitoring system

7. HOGLUND BALLPARK

Home of the Jayhawk baseball program; The entire field is covered in turf, with a different color and grade on the basepaths, at home plate and on the warning track

8. HOREJSI FAMILY ATHLETICS CENTER

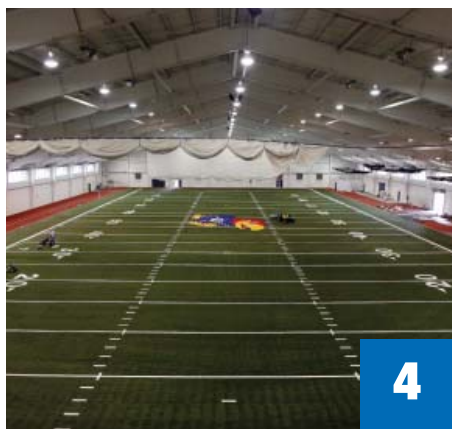
Home of Kansas volleyball since 1999; One of five volleyball-only facilities in the Big 12 Conference, the HFAC also houses a locker room and separate team room for pregame meetings and downtime between classes

9. KU SOCCER COMPLEX AT ROCK CHALK PARK

Home of Kansas soccer; Opened in October 2014, this dedicated facility features a berm surrounding the playing surface and seats over 2,300 fans; Hosted the 2014 NCAA Tournament First Round

10. JAYHAWK TENNIS CENTER

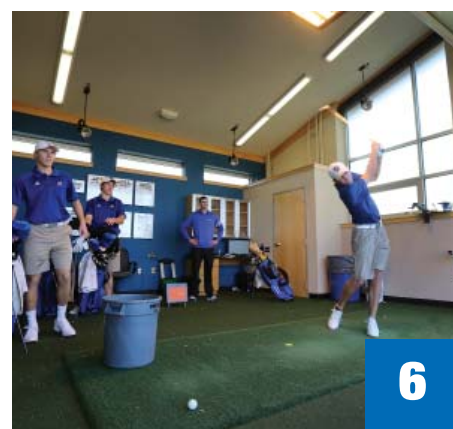
The \$9 million, indoor-outdoor, state-of-the-art facility opened in the Spring of 2017; It features six indoor and six outdoor courts, multiple locker rooms, meeting spaces, coaches’ offices, a team lounge, a training room and a multi-purpose room in which to watch film; The Jayhawk Tennis Center

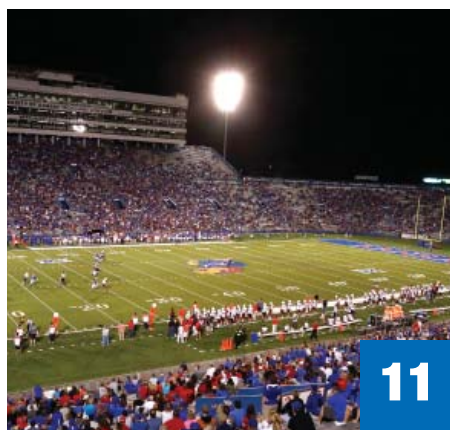

at Rock Chalk Park has stadium seating available both indoor and outdoor for great fan viewing of every court; The outdoor courts have lights for evening matches and every court has its own scoreboard

11. KIVISTO FIELD AT MEMORIAL STADIUM

Recognized as the first stadium built on a college campus west of the Mississippi River, Memorial Stadium is the seventh-oldest collegiate stadium in the nation, as it opened in 1921; Located at the north base of Mt. Oread at 11th and Maine streets in Lawrence, it has a capacity of 50,071; In recent years, the stadium complex has been the focus of major renovations with more than \$30 million in improvements completed

12. RIM ROCK FARM

Located northwest of Lawrence, has been the home of the Jayhawks since the 1974 season; Hosted the 2014 Big 12 Conference and 2015 NCAA Midwest Regional Cross Country Championships

13. ROBINSON NATATORIUM

Home of Kansas swimming and diving for more than 40 years; Current structure features a 25-meter, eight-lane competition pool, a 25-yard, six-lane pool and a diving well

14. ROWING BOATHOUSE

Home of Kansas rowing since 2009; Sits near the Kansas River in Lawrence's Burcham Park; 14,000 square foot facility was dedicated on February 28, 2009

15. KU TRACK COMPLEX AT ROCK CHALK PARK

Home of Kansas track & field; 87th annual Kansas Relays were the first meet to be held at the new facility in April 2014; Recognized by the International Association of Athletics Federations (IAAF) as the fifth Class I Certified track on United States soil and one of only 105 in the entire world; Hosted the NCAA West Preliminary in 2016 and the 2017 Big 12 Championship

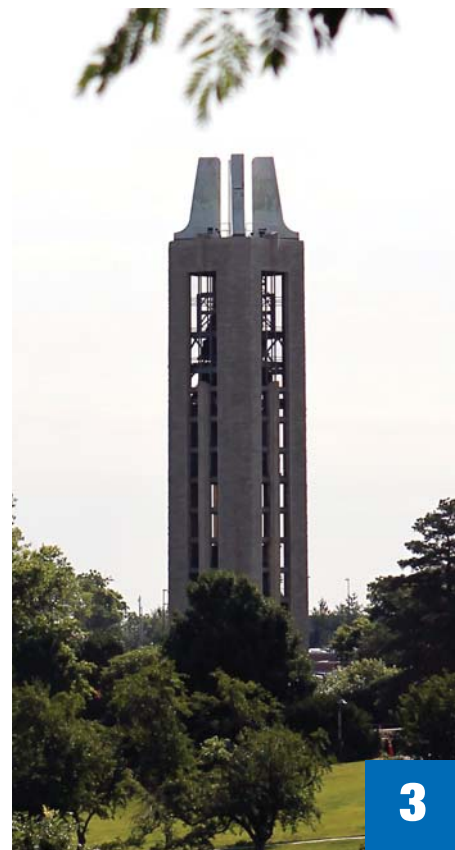

1. THE NICKNAME: JAYHAWK

The University of Kansas is the home of the Jayhawk, a mythical bird with a fascinating history. Its origin is rooted in the historic struggles of Kansas settlers. The term "Jayhawk" was probably coined about 1848. Accounts of its use appeared from Illinois to Texas. The name combines two birds - the blue jay, a noisy, quarrelsome thing known to rob other nests, and the sparrow hawk, a stealthy hunter.

2. THE ALMA MATER

In 1891, professor George Barlow Penny searched for a school song for the Glee and Mandolin Club to sing on its tour through Kansas to Denver and back. No one responded with an original song in answer to his appeals. Just before departure, he thought of the Cornell song "Far Above Cayuga's Waters." Hastily changing a few words, he gave it to the glee club men to sing on the trip. He did not expect the song to be used after their return, but "Crimson and the Blue" still goes on. The music is not Cornell's but an old English folk tune, "Annie Lisle."

3. CAMPANILE HILL

Campanile Hill forms the picturesque backdrop for Memorial Stadium. On a sunny fall Saturday, the "Hill" is transformed into a congregating place for watching Jayhawk football, sunning and barbecuing. Potter Lake, just to the southwest of Memorial Stadium and at the bottom of Campanile Hill, adds to the beauty of the Kansas campus.

4. THE K RING

The K Ring symbolizes a uniquely shared experience between generations of varsity letter winners at the University of Kansas. As a Jayhawk you are expected to uphold tradition and retain the characteristics of a champion while continuing the create your own legacy.

5. WAVING THE WHEAT

Since the early days of KU sports, it has been a ritual of Jayhawk fans to "wave the wheat" following every Kansas scoring drive in football. The tradition also extends to Allen Fieldhouse where fans "wave the wheat" when an opponent fouls out and at the conclusion of every Jayhawk victory. The ritual consists of fans waving their arms in the air, an activity which, when done by a large crowd, resembles a breezy Kansas wheat field.

6. THE ROCK CHALK CHANT

The Rock Chalk Chant has been the battle cry of KU fans for more than 80 years. This strange, traditional chant, which is among the most famous of all college cheers, was started by E.H.S. Bailey, a professor of chemistry. On May 21, 1886, Bailey submitted the cheer to his club.

The university has more than 40 nationally ranked academic programs and is home to major centers overseeing research in life span issues, the humanities, the environment, biodiversity, and polar ice sheets. Last year, KU conducted \$238.8 million in externally funded research, which is new money that flows into Kansas as a result of our research. There more than 38 active startup companies based on KU technologies, and nearly a dozen out-of-state companies have relocated to Kansas to partner with KU researchers since 2010.

Todd Chapman wasted little time making his mark on the Kansas women's tennis program. Chapman, who was named head women's tennis coach at KU in June 2013, led the Jayhawks back to the NCAA Championship for the first time in 17 years in just his third season at the helm of the KU program. A year later, the Jayhawks were back in the NAAs marking the first back-to-back postseason berths in 18 years.

Chapman's short four-year tenure at Kansas is littered with program firsts and the erasing of decade-long droughts, as he continues to orchestrate the program's return to the national stage.

The 2017 season was another example, as not only did the Jayhawks return to the NCAA Tournament but KU also sent a program-best four student-athletes to the prestigious Riviera ITA Women's All-American Championship and also had a doubles team earn an at-large bid to the Division I NCAA Women's Tennis Championship for the first time since 1998. In addition, the Jayhawks earned a No. 14 national ranking in February and remained in the top-25 for seven-consecutive weeks.

Chapman also continued to show his prowess in player development. Anastasia Rychagova earned her

second-straight All-Big 12 First Team selection, while Tess Bernard-Feigenbaum became the first Jayhawk to be named the Big 12 Newcomer of the Year. Bernard-Feigenbaum and Nina Khmelnitckaia were also named All-Big 12 Second Team as a doubles tandem, prior to knocking off the No. 2 overall seed at the NCAA Women's Doubles Championship.

The 2016 campaign saw the Jayhawks post a 17-8 overall mark, including a 6-3 ledger in Big 12 play, garnering them a tie for second place in the league standings. Under Chapman's tutelage, Anastasia Rychagova was tabbed the Big 12 Freshman of the Year and the ITA Central Region Newcomer of the Year. Additionally, Rychagova was named All-Big 12 First Team, while Khmelnitckaia joined her fellow Russian native on the Big 12 All-Freshman Team. For his efforts in elevating the KU program, Chapman was named the 2016 ITA Central Region Coach of the Year.

Chapman, who helped coach Texas Tech to the 2012 and 2013 Big 12 regular-season titles, guided Kansas to eight-consecutive wins to open his inaugural season overseeing the Jayhawk program in 2014.

Chapman followed up his impressive opening campaign at the helm of the KU program by leading the Jayhawks to their best Big 12 Conference finish in six years. KU collected four conference victories in 2015, including a road win over No. 29 Oklahoma.

As an assistant coach at Tech for four years, Chapman helped elevate the Red Raiders from eighth place in the Big 12 in 2009 to the school's first-ever bids to the NCAA Tournament in 2012 and 2013. Over his last three seasons in Lubbock he helped Tech achieve its highest national rankings in school history -- 39th in 2011, 17th in 2012 and 15th in 2013. Tech reached the second round of the team competition in 2013's NCAA Tournament, and their All-Big 12 duo of

Samantha Adams and Kenna Kilgo reached the NCAA round of 16 in the doubles draw.

Prior to his tenure at Texas Tech, Chapman earned Southland Conference Coach of the Year honors as the head men's and women's coach at the University of Texas-Pan American (2001-03). He led UTPA to its first national ranking in 12 years and to a second-place finish in the Southland, the highest conference finish in the school's history.

Chapman spent two years (1999-2001) as the head men's and women's coach at the University of Science & Arts of Oklahoma, an NAIA school in Chickasha, Oklahoma. There, his teams achieved national rankings of No. 17 (men) and No. 15 (women), and made back-to-back appearances in the NAIA Tournament.

Chapman earned success as a head coach at the high school level as well, leading Wichita Falls (Texas) High School to three-straight Class 4A state quarterfinals (2006-08).

As a player at Cameron University in Lawton, Oklahoma, (1994-98), Chapman helped his team to four NCAA Division II Tournaments and a national ranking as high as No. 12. The two-time Lone Star Conference Scholar-Athlete achieved a national ranking in doubles as high as 17.

He began his coaching career as an assistant coach (1998-99) for his alma mater's men's and women's teams, both of whom were ranked in the Top 25.

Chapman and his wife, Amy, have five daughters: Lauren, Madison, Katelyn, Avary and Karsen.

Kansas women's tennis head coach Todd Chapman added an integral piece to his program when he announced the hiring of Caroline Lilley as assistant coach on May 13, 2015. Lilley joined the Jayhawk staff after a standout career as a player at Georgia Tech and a successful stint in a similar coaching role at Gonzaga.

In her two years with the KU program, Lilley's presence has been immediately felt. With back-to-back NCAA Tournament berths for the first time in 18 years, Lilley helped the Jayhawks to a 17-8 overall mark and second-place finish in the Big 12

Conference during the 2016 spring season.

That success and influence carried over in 2017, as KU earned a No. 14 national ranking in February as the Jayhawks remained in the top-25 for seven-consecutive weeks.

Individually, Lilley has guided Anastasia Rychagova to multiple accolades. The 2016 Big 12 Freshman of the Year and the ITA Central Region Newcomer of the Year has also earned All-Big 12 First Team honors in her first two seasons. In addition, Nina Khmelnitckaia, a member of the 2016 Big 12 All-Freshman Team, teamed with Tess Bernard-Feigenbaum on the 2017 All-Big 12 Second Team. Bernard-Feigenbaum also became the first Jayhawk to earn the Big 12 Newcomer of the Year award at the end of the 2017 season.

A Portland, Oregon native, Lilley spent the two seasons prior to joining the KU staff as an assistant coach at Gonzaga, helping the Bulldogs to a 12-9 mark in 2014-15, including a win over No. 55 UC Irvine.

Before joining the Gonzaga staff, Lilley was a volunteer assistant coach at Purdue. With the Boilermakers in 2012-13, the squad reached the

second round of the NCAA Tournament for the second time in school history. In addition, the team achieved a national ranking as high as No. 14, also the highest in school history.

National recognition is nothing new for Lilley as she had an accomplished playing career at both Kentucky (freshman and sophomore) and Georgia Tech (junior and senior). As a player, Lilley was ranked in both singles and doubles competition with highs of No. 67 and No. 6, respectively.

As a senior at Georgia Tech, Lilley helped the club take down an eighth-ranked Alabama squad, 4-3, with a third-set come-from-behind thriller. Lilley claimed the final four games to earn her team the victory. As a junior, she posted a personal best 26-12 record.

Graduating with a business administration degree with a concentration in finance, Lilley left Georgia Tech with the second-best doubles winning percentage of any player. She compiled an impressive 38-17 record including a 20-7 mark in dual match play for a 69.1 winning percentage.

2016-17 REVIEW

In his fourth year, head coach Todd Chapman led the Kansas women's tennis team back to the national stage for a second-consecutive year. The Jayhawks started strong in the fall and were able to maintain that effort in the spring and find their way to the NCAA Championships after 2016's berth broke a 17-year drought.

Starting the season at the Little Rock Invitational in September, three Jayhawks took home titles. Sophomore Anastasia Rychagova was named Champion of Flight A Singles, while freshmen Tatiana Nikolaeva and Maria Toran Ribes were named Co-Champions of Flight C Singles. In October, Kansas had four players selected to participate in the prestigious Riviera Intercollegiate Tennis Association (ITA) Women's All-American Championship for the first time since 2011. Partnering for the first time at the ITA Central Regional, the doubles pair of senior transfer Tess Bernard-Feigenbaum and sophomore Nina Khmelnitckaia won five-straight matches before falling in the title draw.

In late February, the Jayhawks broke into the top-25 at No. 14, earning the program's best ranking since Kansas ended the 1994 season at No. 7. After entering the poll at No. 14, KU spent seven-consecutive weeks in the top-25 and ended the season as the No. 39 team in the nation. Of Kansas' 22 opponents, 16 teams were ranked among the top-50 at some point during the season. Throughout Big 12 Conference play, KU was ranked along with six other league opponents.

In March, the Jayhawks defeated No. 22 TCU for the first time in program history with a 4-1 victory. During the same weekend, Bernard-Feigenbaum earned a career-best win over No. 6-ranked Texas Tech's No. 40 Felicity Maltby with a 7-6 (7-2), 7-6 (7-3) win at No. 2 singles.

Kansas went on to win four straight before injury struck the team for the second year in a row. Down to just five players, KU was in the heart of its schedule - left to face five ranked teams, play in the Big

12 Championship and await its fate for the NCAA Tournament. After a strong regular season, the Jayhawks were set to face No. 32-ranked Notre Dame in the first round of the NCAA Tournament. The shorthanded No. 34 Kansas team went toe-to-toe with Notre Dame throughout the match, but was not able to top the Fighting Irish and fell, 4-3, ending the season with a 13-11 record.

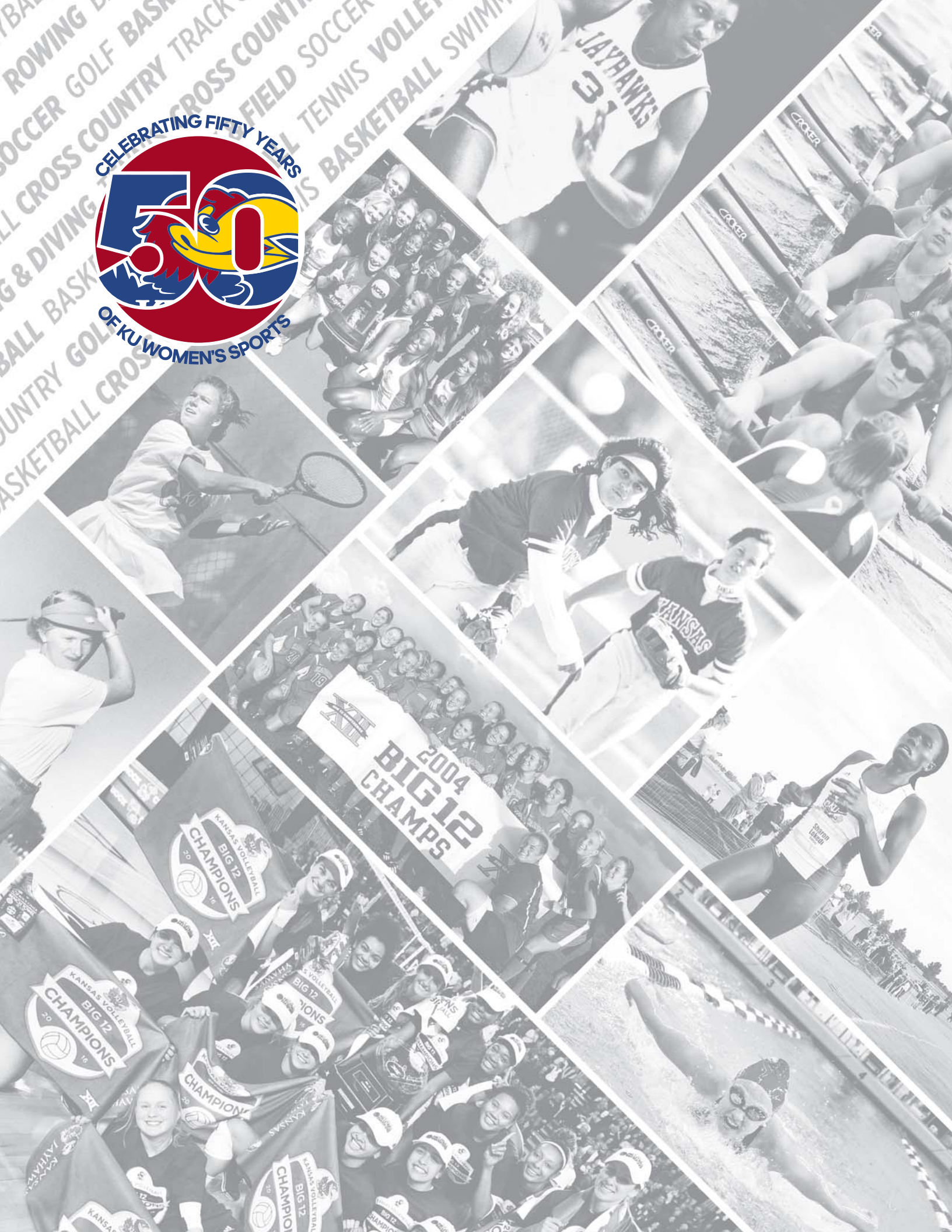
Although the team portion of the spring season had come to a close, Bernard-Feigenbaum and Khmelnitckaia were headed to the NCAA Division I Women's Tennis Championships. Earning an at-large berth, the duo became the first Jayhawks to participate in the Championships since 1998. In the first round, the No. 37-ranked doubles team rallied from a 4-0 deficit to post a 3-6, 6-4, 10-8 victory over the No. 2-seeded team of Jasmine Lee and Lisa Marie Rioux of Mississippi State, marking a career-best win for both players. Bernard-Feigenbaum and Khmelnitckaia were not able to rally in the Round of 16, dropping the match to Denver's No. 17-ranked Julia O'Loughlin and Maureen Slattery, 6-4, 6-2, officially ending the 2016-17 campaign.

- ▶ The Jayhawks ended the 2016-17 season with a 13-11 record.

2017-18 OUTLOOK

After returning to the NCAA Championship for the second-consecutive year, head coach Todd Chapman and the Kansas women's tennis team head into the 2017-18 season with hopes that their new-found standard will continue.

The Jayhawks return six out of seven players from last year's team, which ranked No. 39 nationally, ended with a 13-11 mark and finished the season tied for sixth in the highly competitive Big 12 Conference. They include juniors Nina Khmelnitckaia, Janet Koch and Anastasia Rychagova, along with sophomores

Tatiana Nikolaeva, Maria Toran Ribes and redshirt freshman Amber Policare.

"The biggest thing I'm looking forward to is that we have six players coming back," said Chapman. "We've been a very young team for the last several

years and haven't returned very many. From a results and positioning standpoint with our program, we have the opportunity to take some great strides and move in a direction that everyone can be proud of."

By returning six players in the lineup, the expectations surrounding the Jayhawks are at new heights. Kansas welcomes two newcomers – senior transfer Despoina Vogasari and freshman Carla Pons Martorell.

Looking to bounce back from injury, Vogasari will complete her last year of eligibility with the Jayhawks. For her first three years, Vogasari played at the University of Houston, where she became the first Cougar since 2002 to qualify for the NCAA Singles Championship and made two appearances at the USTA/ITA National Indoor Championships.

"Bringing Debbie (Vogasari) in has the opportunity to be a really big addition to our team," said Chapman. "Three years of experience playing at number one, being in the national rankings, two National Indoors, the NCAA Singles Championship; she brings with her a confidence and an experience level that you don't gain all the time in these situations."

Pons Martorell, the lone true freshman on the team, is from Oliva, Valencia, Spain. In high school, she won the Spanish Doubles Championship, was named Champion of the Valencian Community, was a semifinalist in the Spanish Championship, and her team won the Valencian Community Championship and the Spanish Championship.

"We're excited to get Carla out on the courts and see where she's at," said Chapman. "We believe in her talents and what type of player she can be by our recruitment of her. During someone's freshman year, there's always a maturation process, a transition process and you just don't know, as a coach, how long it's going to take for them to settle in. My hope is that it happens sooner rather than later. At some point this season it's going to click for her and we're going to see the abilities she has. We definitely believe she can be an impact player for us this season."

Khmelnitckaia, who posted an 18-9 singles record and a 22-14 doubles mark last year, will enter the season ranked with Rychagova as the No. 37 doubles team in the nation.

"Nina is one who has really grown as a player in her two years on the court," said Chapman. "She gained a lot of good experience this past season, especially in doubles. Having a great year in doubles, making the NCAA Tournament and making the Round of 16 hopefully gives her some confidence of where she is in her game and belief that she can compete on an elite level. She's one that has the opportunity to have



a year where she establishes herself as a player on the national scene if she will just believe in herself as much as we do."

Coming off of a season where she put up a 25-8 singles record, Rychagova nabbed the No. 35 spot in the preseason rankings.

"Nas has had a really good start to her career," said Chapman. "She had a really good summer building off her freshman and sophomore seasons. I look for her to have the opportunity to break out and continue building upon her game. She's an extremely intelligent player. A very gritty player."

Joining Khmelnitckaia and Rychagova in the rankings is fellow junior Koch. Vogasari and Koch will kick off the 2017-18 season ranked as the No. 50 doubles pair.

"Janet has two really good years of experience under her belt," said Chapman. "I look for her to get a little bit of her confidence and swagger back she had her freshman year. She put in good work this summer and will provide a lot of depth and experience in our lineup."

Both Nikolaeva and Toran Ribes recorded 20 singles wins during their freshman seasons. After Toran Ribes' season ended in late March due to injury, Nikolaeva stepped up to play in the No. 5 spot for the Jayhawks.

"Tanya has worked hard," said Chapman. "By the end of the season she was playing her best tennis. For her, it's the same as a couple other players on our team; if Tanya starts to believe in herself the way that she should, she has the opportunity to really spring board from last year's season."

"Maria was off to a really good start for the first two thirds of the season before she was hampered with injury and unable to finish the spring season. She was doing a great job singles and doubles wise. We

hope that we can keep her healthy and she can build upon those experiences, positive and negative, from last year and use those entering her sophomore year to be a major part of what we're trying to do on and off the court."

Policare, the lone redshirt on the team, graduated high school early and joined the Jayhawks for the spring 2017 season. Although she did not see any match time, Policare contributed to the team during practice and warmups.

"The Amber who is on our team right now is completely different than the Amber who showed up in Lawrence in January," said Chapman. "She's really matured, learned how to push herself and be much tougher. I'm really proud of the work she put in last spring and this summer. She's positioned herself mentally and physically to have a great freshman season."

Kansas and the Jayhawk Tennis Center will play host for two fall tournaments, the ITA Regional Championship from October 19 to 23 and the Kansas Invitational the following weekend, October 27 to 29.

"It's a huge opportunity for the University of Kansas to host the ITA Central Regional Championship," said Chapman. "We're excited about bringing all of the teams in our region to Lawrence to showcase the facility we're so proud of and fortunate to have. It's a great opportunity for us to show that we can put on a really good event and that our facility has the capability to successfully host large events."

"The last four years we haven't played an event at home, so to have two events at home this fall is really exciting. The team gets to play in front of the home crowd in the fall and it's an opportunity for fans and people who follow the program to see our new players and returners play before we get into the spring."

Douglas A. Girod, M.D., became the 18th chancellor of the University of Kansas on July 1, 2017, after serving for four years as executive vice chancellor of the University of Kansas Medical Center. There he oversaw the educational, research, patient care and community engagement missions of the University of Kansas schools of Medicine, Nursing and Health Professions, with their total annual enrollment of more than 3,300 students; a workforce of more than 2,100 faculty and more than 4,000 staff; and research funding of nearly \$100 million.

In addition to serving as executive vice chancellor, Dr. Girod also served as interim executive dean of the KU School of Medicine until March 24, 2014. Prior to those roles, he served as senior associate dean for clinical affairs and chair of the Department of Otolaryngology-Head and Neck Surgery. A surgeon, Dr. Girod joined the University of Kansas Medical Center faculty in 1994 and quickly rose

through the academic ranks, becoming chair of the otolaryngology department in 2002. He was named Russell E. Bridwell Endowed Chair in 2008.

Dr. Girod earned his bachelor's degree in chemistry from the University of California at Davis and his medical degree from the University of California at San Francisco. He completed his residency and an NIH research fellowship at the University of Washington in Seattle. Prior to joining the University of Kansas Medical Center, Dr. Girod served as vice chairman and research director in the Department of Otolaryngology at the Naval Medical Center in Oakland, California. He served in the United States Navy Reserve from 1982, rising to the rank of lieutenant commander and later earning the Meritorious Service Medal.

Dr. Sheahon (SHAY-un) Zenger's genuine care for coaches and student-athletes has hallmarked his career in intercollegiate athletics.

That care, which he has exhibited since his arrival as Athletics Director in January 2011, has helped KU's coaches and student-athletes achieve outstanding performances on both the conference and national stages. Highlights include:

- A National Championship for the Women's Outdoor Track & Field team, and seven individual national championships.
- NCAA Final Four and two Elite 8 appearances for Men's Basketball and seven Big 12 Conference regular-season championships, raising that streak of titles to a record-tying 13.
- NCAA Final Four and Sweet 16 (and five straight NCAA) appearances for Volleyball.
- Two NCAA Sweet 16 appearances for Women's Basketball.
- NCAA Tournament appearances for Softball (twice), Soccer (twice), Men's Golf (twice), Tennis (twice), Baseball and Women's Golf.
- Four National Coach-of-the-Year awards – Stanley Redwine, women's track and field; Bill Self, men's basketball; Ray Bechard, volleyball, and Laura Kuhn (assistant coach), volleyball – and several Big 12 Conference Coach-of-the-Year awards – Self (four times), Bechard (four times), Redwine (three times) and Clark Campbell, swimming (twice). In addition, tennis coach Todd Chapman was named 2016 Coach of the Year for the Central Region after leading the Jayhawks to their first NCAA Tournament appearance in 17 years.

During 2016-17, 10 KU teams were represented in NCAA postseason competition.

Zenger has spearheaded some \$90 million in new Kansas Athletics facilities as well – improvements he expects will help KU's coaches and student-athletes continue their run of outstanding performances. Notable among these is the completion of the DeBruce Center, the permanent home of James Naismith's original "Rules of Basket Ball." In addition, a \$2 million renovation of the football locker room is now complete. The track surrounding the football field was removed in summer 2014, replaced with new artificial turf, bringing the turf to within 10 feet of the stands. A \$1 million renovation of the Jayhawks' Sports Medicine Facility has provided modernized rehabilitation, an x-ray room and treatment areas.

Fall 2015 saw the opening of McCarthy Hall, which houses the men's basketball team and an equal number of non-student-athletes. The beautiful new, nationally acclaimed Rock Chalk Park, home to KU soccer, softball, and track and field, has already hosted USA, NCAA and Big 12 Conference meets, and more are on the horizon. And the new Jayhawk Tennis Center, a 12-court indoor-outdoor complex at Rock Chalk Park, now houses the KU tennis team.

Stressing a culture of competitiveness and citizenship, Zenger has instituted KU Leads, a student-athlete development program dedicated to fostering committed leaders and supporting career development.

Zenger came to KU after serving for five years as athletics director at Illinois State University, helping steer ISU Athletics to a place of prominence in the Missouri Valley Conference. He earned two degrees from Kansas State before coming to KU to earn his Ph.D. in educational policy and leadership, strengthening his understanding of university leadership at the highest levels.

Zenger is married to the former Pam McAnarney; they have three children: Luke and Abby, who are in college, and Jake, who's in high school.
