HEAD COACH ERIN O'NEIL

Fifth Season (Georgia, 1997)

Erin O'Neil returns for her fifth season as head coach of the women's golf team at the University of Kansas.

O'Neil came to KU in 2004 after four seasons as an assistant at Auburn. In her first season as head coach, O'Neil led the Jayhawks to a first-place finish at the Marilynn Smith Sunflower Invitational, the program's first team title since 2000. Coach O'Neil's teams have also notched first-place finishes at the 2006 Mountain View Collegiate and the 2006 and 2007 Marilynn Smith Sunflower Invitationals.

Coach O'Neil has overseen the development of several individual champions while at KU, including current Jayhawk Emily Powers (2008 Marilynn Smith Invitational, U.S. Open qualifier) and recent graduates Annie Giangrosso (2006 Kansas Women's Amateur champion), Amanda Costner (2005 Lady Boilermaker Champion, All-Big 12 First Team, NCAA Regional qualifier, 2007 Big 12 Champion) and Chelsey Pryor (2005 ORU Shootout winner).

While at Auburn, O'Neil helped lead the Tigers to three top-10 NCAA Championship team finishes, including a tie for second in 2002. She coached four All-Americans and seven all-conference selections during her stint there.

Before joining the Auburn program, O'Neil played professionaly for three years on the Futures Tour and the Kosaido Ladies Asian Tour.

She was a four-year letterwinner at the University of Georgia from 1994-97 and led the Bulldogs to a pair of SEC Championships in 1994 and 1997.

O'Neil was a three-time All-SEC selec-

tion from 1994-96 and earned SEC Freshman of the Year honors in 1994. She won the 1995 Auburn Tiger-Derby Invitational and shot a 66 at the 1997 SEC Championship, the second lowest round in UGA history.

O'Neil was listed on the Director's Honor Roll for six quarters while at Georgia and was a two-time SEC Academic Honor Roll selection in 1996 and 1997.

As an amateur, O'Neil qualified for seven United States Amateur Championships, as well as two United States Opens.

Third Season (Arkansas, 2006)

Sarah Trew begins her third season at the University of Kansas as the assistant coach. Trew continues her first coaching job with a wealth of playing experience to bring to the table.

Trew began her college career at the University of Georgia from 2001-03. She played one season for the Bulldogs and took a redshirt the next.

In 2003, she transferred to the University of Arkansas. While with the Razorbacks, Trew was named to the SEC academic honor roll all three years.

She ended her career with the eighthlowest career stroke average in Arkansas' women's golf history.

Trew graduated in May 2006 with a

bachelor's degree in criminal justice and sociology.

Following graduation, she turned professional in July 2006 and played in select events. Trew was a qualifier for the finals of the Re-Max World Long Drive Challenge in 2006 and 2007.

"Since I have been at KU, I have seen us improve every year," said Trew.

"The young ladies are meeting and exceeding their goals faster and faster, as well as constantly challenging each other to be the best. I believe the future of Kansas women's golf is extremely bright."



POWERS COMPETES ON NATIONAL STAGE AT 63RD U.S. WOMEN'S OPEN CHAMPIONSHIP

College basketball has the Final Four. The NFL has the Super Bowl. For the sport of golf, however, the U.S. Open is arguably the most prestigious event in which a golfer can compete. Last spring, KU golfer Emily Powers was presented with an opportunity of a lifetime when she qualified for the 2008 US Women's Open in Edina, Minn. Playing alongside prominent professionals such as Annika Sorenstam and Michelle Wie, Powers was able to showcase her skills against some of the top competition in the world.

For Powers, a junior from Quincy, Ill., the road to the Open was fairly roundabout. After shooting an 82 in the local stage of qualifying, Powers was given an alternate spot for the sectional qualifier in the off chance that anyone dropped out. Although disappointed in her performance, Powers remained prepared in case a spot opened up.

As it turned out, that optimism paid off for Powers as she received an unexpected phone call last June.

"Eighteen hours before the sectional was to tee off, I got a call saying that I could come play," explained Powers.

On short notice, Powers and her father hurried to Chicago, the site of the sectional. When they arrived at Skokie Country Club that evening, Powers and her father found that they had only enough daylight to survey the course for about an hour.

Despite the chaotic schedule, Powers teed off at 7 a.m. the next morning and shot a 78. Later that afternoon, she fired a 76 in the second round. At the end of a hectic 24 hours, Powers found herself in a nine-way tie to be decided by a one-hole sudden death playoff the next morning. Up for grabs were the last two spots to go to the U.S. Open.

Sensing the incredible opportunity in front of her, Powers was determined to come out strong. Playing one of the most difficult holes on the course, Powers was one of two women to make par, securing one of the final two spots to qualify for the U.S. Open.

Playing in front of thousands of spectators and a national television audience is certainly an intimidating task for any amateur athlete. Powers, however, saw the Open as an opportunity to showcase her skills in front of the top golfers in the world.

"I knew that if playing professionally is what I want to do as my career – which it is – then I needed to get past that intimidation in order to compete at their level."

She teed off in a foursome that included professionals Katherine Hull, Nicole Castrale and Laura Diaz. Her time with these three allowed her to gain invaluable insight into what it takes to make it professionally.

"Talking to those three really taught me a lot about the things I need to do and work on to be at their level. I also learned valuable lessons that I can take to college tournaments and share with my teammates."

Although her performance was not quite enough to make the final cut, Powers' two rounds at the U.S. Open provided her with nothing but positive memories.



Powers led the KU golf team this fall with a 75.07 scoring average.

"My dad was my caddie and my mom and sister came along to watch. Coach O'Neil also came and walked inside the ropes for one of the practice rounds, which was great. It was nice to see all of those who supported me."

Armed with an experience that very few amateurs get the opportunity to participate in, Powers is prepared to face the challenges she will encounter in her remaining two years at KU, and beyond.

"I just hope to keep working hard and get everything out of my experiences here as possible," said Powers. "After going to the Open and seeing all of the women who play, I realize I look up to all of them and all the hard work they have put into their sport."



2008 Fall Recap

The Kansas women's golf program opened its 30th season of play at the Chip-N-Club Invitational in Lincoln, Neb. Led by a third-round score of 73 from sophomore Grace Thiry, the Jayhawks finished in seventh place with a three-round total 916 at the Wilderness Ridge Golf Course.

Next the team returned home to host the Marilynn Smith Sunflower Invitational at Lawrence's Alvamar Public Golf Course. The exciting weekend concluded with a two-hole playoff between Nebraska and eventual champion Oral Roberts. The Jayhawks finished their home tournament in fifth place behind a strong individual performance from Emily Powers. The junior from Quincy, Ill., finished atop the individual standings with a score of 223. Finishing in second place in the overall standings was sophomore Jennifer Clark, who was competing as an individual.

The team next traveled east along Interstate-70 to Columbia, Mo., to compete in the Johnie Imes Invitational. After shooting back-to-back opening rounds of 306, the team finished strong with a third-round 301 to notch a fifth place finish for the second week in a row. Powers' season-low 221 was good for a sixth-place tie in the individual standings. Also performing well for the Jayhawks were sophomores Meghna Bal and Clark, who tied for 14th place with scores of 228.

Coach Erin O'Neil and the Jayhawks next headed to the Lone Star state to compete in the McHaney/Morehead Invitational in Lubbock, Texas. The 13-team tournament featured seven Big 12 schools. After three rounds of play, KU finished in seventh place with a composite score of 943. Powers' third top-10 performance (227, T7) of the season led the way for the Jayhawks.

The Jayhawks concluded the fall season with a trip to Auburn, Ala., where they competed in The Derby, hosted by Auburn University. The 17-team event featured 13 of the top 50 teams in the nation, according to GolfStat.com. Bal's season-low 224 (12th place) led the Jayhawks to a 14th place finish (311-306-314--931).

"The fall season gave us the opportunity to learn where some of our weaknesses are and what we need to continue to work on in practice and competition," said Coach O'Neil. "In the grand scheme of things we are a young team. They are a very talented, dedicated group of players who I believe will accomplish great things in their time here at KU."

2009 Spring Preview

After nearly four months since their last tournament, the KU women's golf team returns to action this spring with five events against some of the best competition in the country. The Jayhawks will travel to Florida, Arizona, Georgia, Oklahoma and Ohio this spring before heading to Lubbock, Texas to compete in the Big 12 Championship in late April.

The Jayhawks open the spring season in Parrish, Fla., where they will compete in the Central District Invitational, Feb. 16-17. In 2006, KU finished in seventh place at the Invitational, which is again being held at the Wilderness Golf Club.

After a week off, the Jayhawks will head to Rio Verde, Ariz., to compete in the Rio Verde Collegiate, March 6-8. Hosted by Western Michigan, the tournament will be held at the 18-hole Quail Run course at Rio Verde Country Club, which opened in 2007.

The team then heads south to Athens, Ga., where they will compete in the Liz Murphey Collegiate, March 27-29. Hosted by the University of Georgia, the 37th annual event will be played at the UGA Golf Course.

Coach Erin O'Neil will then take the team to Norman, Okla., where they will compete in the 31st annual Susie Maxwell Berning Classic, April 5-6. The Jayhawks will look to have another strong performance at the Jimmie Austin OU Golf Club, where they finished in third place last spring.

KU next travels to Big 10 country, where it will compete in the Lady Buckeye Spring Invitational in Columbus, Ohio, April 18-19. Hosted by Ohio State, the Invitational will be held at the par-71 Scarlet Course at the Ohio State Golf Course Facility.

Kansas' postseason will begin April 24-26 at the Big 12 Championship at the Rawls Course in Lubbock, Texas. The Rawls Course is familiar to the Jayhawks, as the team finished in fifth place at the McHaney/Morehead Invitational in October. The team will look to improve off of last year's 10th place finish at the Championship.

"I am very excited about our spring tournaments," said Coach O'Neil. "It is probably one of the most competitive schedules we have had in some time."

"We will have the chance to compete against some of the best teams in the country, as well as play on some incredible golf courses."



2007-08 SEASON RECAP

The Jayhawks opened the 2007 fall season in Lincoln, Neb., at the Chip-N-Club Invitational. Emily Powers' 10th-place individual performance led the team to a fifth-place finish out of 19 teams. KU used rounds of 313-305-303 to finish with a final total 921 at Woodland Hills Golf Club.

The team next headed west to compete in the Ron Moore Women's Intercollegiate in Denver, Colo. Behind a seventh-place finish from Powers – a performance that included a five-under-par, third-round total 67 – the team finished eighth out of 18 teams. Powers' round of 67 tied Amanda Costner (10-10-05) for the lowest one-round score in program history. KU finished the tournament with a three-round total of 911 (309-308-294).

After two tournaments out of state, the team returned to Kansas to play in the Marilynn Smith Sunflower Invitational in Manhattan, a tournament it had won the previous year. The Jayhawks led rival Missouri by two strokes after two rounds of play. Heavy thunderstorms forced the cancellation of the final round and the Jayhawks were able to defend their title with a two-round total 600 (302-298). Camilla Svensson was KU's top finisher, tying for fourth at three-over par 147.

Riding high on their first-place finish, the Jayhawks next headed to Las Cruces, N.M., to compete at Price's "Give 'Em Five" Invitational. The team fired rounds of 302-302-304 for a 44-over-par 908 to claim a fourth-place finish. Powers led the way for the 'Hawks as she tied for eighth with two other players with a score of 223.

The Jayhawks concluded the fall season with a trip south where they competed in the UA-Ann Rhoades Intercollegiate in Tuscaloosa, Ala. The highly competitive field featured three teams ranked in the nation's top 10, including No. 5 Florida, No. 6 Auburn and seventh-ranked Arkansas. The team finished the tournament in 13th place after posting a three-round total 926 (317-312-297).

After four months off, the Jayhawks opened the spring season at the Qdoba Invitational in Miami Lakes, Fla. The team again faced strong competition, with 11 of the 12 teams ranked in GolfStat.com's top-100. The Jayhawks put together a final round 300 - their best of the tournament - to finish sixth overall with a three-day total of 921 (307-314-300).

Next, the team headed west to compete in the Kitahara Invitational in Fresno, Calif. Freshman Meghna Bal fired an opening-round one-under-par 71 as the Jayhawks saw themselves atop the leaderboard after day one. After posting a 301 in round two, however, the team slipped two spots to finish the tournament in third place with a combined total of 596.

After a three-week hiatus, the Jayhawks traveled to Austin, Texas to compete in the 35th annual Betsy Rawls Longhorn Invitational. Heavy rains in round two shortened the event to 36 holes. KU finished in 13th place after shooting a two-round total 657 (325-332). Freshman Grace Thiry led the team with a 24th place individual finish with a 160.

The Jayhawks continued the spring season at the Mountain View Collegiate in Tuscon, Ariz., an event they won in 2006. In the third round, Powers fired a 70, her lowest of the tournament, to secure a seventh place finish individually. As a team, the Jayhawks jumped three spots in the final round to finish in 11th place with a three-round total 909 (299 308 302)

The team next traveled to Norman, Okla. to compete in its final event of the regular season - the 30th annual Susie Maxwell Berning Classic. Despite the strong Oklahoma winds, the Jayhawks posted a third-round 294 to finish in third place with a 898 (304-300-294). Powers once again led the team individually, posting a 223 (77-73-73) to finish in a tie for 14th place.

ALVAMAR GOLF CLUB

Alvamar opened for play on May 15, 1968, and included two original nines, Jayhawk and Quail Creek. The two courses were joined by the Hidden Valley nine in 1973 and The Sunflower in 1978. In 1982, the Hidden Valley and Sunflower nines were consolidated into Alvamar Country Club.

Alvamar was named by developer Bob Billings from the contraction of his parents' names, Alva and Margaretta Billings of Russell, Kan. The Alvamar Golf and Country Clubs encompass over 3,000 acres of West Lawrence. The 36 holes at Alvamar were designed by Mel

Anderson and Bob Dunning and include a public and private club-house, driving range and three practice greens. The two courses at Alvamar were the first in the United States to utilize zoysia grass for its fairways and tees. The course currently uses cohansey bent green on both surfaces.

In 1991, Alvamar Country Club hosted the Kansas Amateur. Alvamar Golf Club annually hosts the Kansas Open and has been the site of the United States Golf Association's Women's Public Links tournament. It was the site of the Big Eight Conference Men's Championship for eight consecutive years. In 1990, the Big Eight Conference Women's Championship was held at Alvamar and was won by the Jayhawks. Alvamar Golf Club hosted the inaugural Big 12



Women's Championship in 1997 and is the site of the KU men's Kansas Invitational and women's Marilynn Smith Sunflower Invitational.

Having been honored as one of the "best maintained golf courses in the United States" by Grounds Maintenance Magazine, Alvamar continues to improve its attractive golf venue. Alvamar's Director of Golf is former KU player and former women's head coach, Brad Demo. Randy Towner serves as head professional at Alvamar Country Club.

Alvamar Country Club is considered one of the finest golf courses in the state. Alvamar's reputation is one of the reasons KU attracts some of the top golfers in the country.

The Knapheide Family Practice Facility at Alvamar

Last fall, construction was completed on the newest addition to the Kansas golf program's state-of-the-art facilities: the Knapheide Family Practice Facility.

The new practice facility consists of four climate-controlled hitting bays with cutting-edge swing technology. There are three smaller bays in addition to one larger bay, which is equipped with a V1 video swing analysis system and a Trackman radar launch monitoring system.

"We are incredibly excited about our new hitting facility," said head coach Erin O'Neil. "It

will allow us to hit shots and work on our putting under realistic conditions during January and February."

Armed with this valuable new facility, the KU golf team looks to have a productive winter in preparation for the spring season and beyond.

"It will have a positive impact on our players' confidence levels, especially for the first couple of tournaments in the spring," said O'Neil.

MARILYNN SMITH

- Kansas All-American
- LPGA Co-Founder

At age 79, Marilynn Smith, or "Miss Personality", remains an influential figure in the world of women's golf. Smith, who resides in Goodyear, Ariz., currently teaches golf and hosts the Kansas golf program's home tournament named in her honor.

A native of Topeka, Kan., and graduate of KU, Smith was one of the original 13 founders of the Ladies Professional Golf Association (LPGA) in 1950. Smith won 21 tournaments while on tour with the LPGA, including the 1963 and 1964 Titleholders, one of the major women's events at the time. Her first LPGA title was in 1954 at the Fort Wayne (Ind.) Open, and her final tournament win came in 1972 at the Pabst Ladies Classic.

Before Smith helped found the LPGA, she left a legacy at Kansas. She won the Kansas Women's Amateur Championship from 1946 to 1948, and was crowned champion of the 1949 National Collegiate Individual tournament.

Smith then accepted an offer from Spalding to turn pro for \$5,000 a year. In 14 seasons between 1954-1972, she won at least one event while on tour. She served as the LPGA's president from 1958 to 1960. Smith made history at the 1972 U.S. Open Championship when she became the first female

television commentator to cover a men's golf tournament.

Smith has formed a number of golf events, including the Marilynn Smith Founders Classic - the first senior women's professional golf tournament - and the Marilynn Smith Dallas EWGA Golf Championship.

In 1979, Smith received the inaugural Patty Berg Award for distinguished service to women's golf. *Golf Digest* presented her the LPGA Founders Cup for charitable service off the course in 1983.

She was also selected as one of the Distinguished Champions of the Vincent T. Lombardi Tournament in 1987. The award recognizes leadership in sports and demonstration of high ideals of public good. In 1991 she was inducted into the Women's Sports Foundation International Hall of Fame.

The collegiate tournament, The Marilynn Smith Invitational, was named in her honor in 1993 and teams from around the country compete in the annual event.

In recognition of her professional, personal and amateur accomplishments, Smith was recently inducted into the World Golf Hall of Fame through the Lifetime Achievement category in 2006.

JAYHAWK GREATS: **AMANDA COSTNER**



Thumbing through the Kansas women's golf media guide it doesn't take long to identify one name that appears at the top of every records list: Amanda Costner. From 2004-2007, Costner established herself as one of the all-time greats in program history; her list of accomplishments speaks for itself:

- The lowest scoring average in KU history (75.45, '05-'06)
- Three of the five lowest rounds in KU history
- Three of the five lowest three-round performances in KU history
- Nine top-10 finishes
- All Big 12 First Team 2006 & 2007

Costner's incredible career culminated at the 2007 Big 12 Championship in Waco, Texas. She led the field after the first two rounds after posting a 71 and 73, respectively. In the final round, Costner posted a 77 to hold on and win the Big 12 individual title, becoming the first Jayhawk to win the event.

As exceptional a career as she had on the golf course, Costner's accomplishments off the course were equally impressive. She was named an NGCA Academic All American in 2005-06 and 2006-07. As a senior, she was named to the Academic All-Big 12 First Team, graduating with a degree in Applied Behavioral Science. That season she was named the Big 12 Female Sportsperson of the Year, an award that recognizes student-athletes who display an extraordinary degree of sportsmanship and/or community service.

After graduation, Costner, a native of Claremore, Okla., decided to turn professional playing the sport she loves. In 2007 she joined the Duramed FUTURES Tour, the official developmental tour of the LPGA. Since turning professional, Costner has competed in nine events and is ranked 157th on the tour entering the 2009 season.

KANSAS ROOTS, GLOBAL REACH

The University of Kansas — fondly known as KU — is a tradition-rich, comprehensive research university that throughout its distinguished history has excelled in creating superior, enduring value for students, the state of Kansas and the world.

Founded by the same determined New Englanders who had emigrated to the Kansas Territory to create a state free of slavery, KU became one of the first universities of the Great Plains. The university opened its doors on Sept. 12, 1866, to 29 men and 26 women. Never in its history has KU restricted admissions based on race or gender.

Since its early years, KU has been fueled by high aspirations and today enjoys a national reputation for innovation and academic excellence. In 1890, the first chapters of Phi Beta Kappa and Sigma Xi west of the Mississippi River were chartered at Lawrence. The following year, the KU Endowment Association was established, the first foundation of its kind supporting a state-assisted university. Not to be forgotten: KU initiated interscholastic basketball competition in 1898 under the leadership of Dr. James Naismith, the inventor of the game.

With a student body of nearly 30,000 and an endowment with assets of more than \$1 billion, KU has become a diversified, broad-based center of learning with professional schools in allied health, architecture and urban planning, business, education, engineering, fine arts, journalism and mass communications, law, medicine, nursing, pharmacy and social welfare. KU also has expanded geographically, adding the KU Medical Center in Kansas City, Kan.; the School of Medicine clinical branch in Wichita; the Edwards Campus in Overland Park; and educational and research facilities throughout the state.

In addition, KU prepares students for success in an increasingly global economy. Among public universities, KU ranks seventh in the nation for the percentage of its students who study abroad and 25th in the nation for the number of graduates serving as Peace Corps volunteers.

WORLD-CLASS, ACCESSIBLE EDUCATION

KU teachers have earned international distinction: 12 have been elected national academy members, 33 are fellows of the American Association for the Advancement of Science and 283 have received Fulbright awards for international study since 1950. Astronaut Steve Hawley, a Salina native and KU graduate, will return to Lawrence in fall 2008 to join the Department of Physics and Astronomy. He'll teach students and travel the state emphasizing the importance of science education.

Led by these world-class teachers, KU students have achieved an impressive record of major honors: 25 Rhodes, 406 Fulbright, 45 Goldwater, 24 Mellon, 16 Truman, 16 Udall and nine Marshall scholarships. Architecture magazine has twice bestowed its "Home of the Year" award on KU student-built projects. The debate team has won four national titles. Journalism and math students have placed first in their respective collegiate competitions.

The attractiveness of KU to outstanding high school graduates is reflected in the current student body. In fall 2007, 30 percent of KU first-time freshmen scored 27 or higher on the ACT or converted SAT equivalent. Nationally, 15 percent of ACT test takers scored 27 or above. The average freshman ACT score of 24.6 is a record high for KU, well above the national average of 22 Last fall, KU enrolled 35 National Merit scholars, eight National Hispanic scholars and two National Achievement scholars.

PATH-BREAKING RESEARCH

KU is known for bioscience research in areas such as cancer, vaccines and Parkinson's disease. The KU Cancer Center seeks to heighten Kansans' access to breakthrough treatments by becoming a designated National Cancer Institute Comprehensive Cancer Center. Strong programs in drug development and delivery are fueled by the School of Pharmacy, which is No. I in the nation in portion of faculty funded by the prestigious National Institutes of Health, and No. 4 overall in funding. KU's total research expenditures in all disciplines reached \$289 million in 2007.

There are 19 KU-developed technologies in the marketplace and nearly 70 new invention disclosures a year. Professors across campus are researching critical topics such as climate change, monarch migration, payday lending businesses and avian flu. KU students contribute to major research, too. One student studied why — despite the risks — people talk on cell phones while driving.

DEEP ANALYSIS OF KU

A nationwide study by Indiana University, the "Documenting Effective Educational Practice" report, in 2004 lauded KU as a progressive research university that thoroughly engaged students in the learning process. "Many other colleges and universities will benefit from learning about KU policies and practice," the DEEP report stated.







ATHLETIC DIRECTOR LEW PERKINS



Lew Perkins has served as Director of Athletics at the University of Kansas since June 2003. He arrived at KU after achieving nationally recognized success as athletics director at the University of Connecticut. Kansas Athletics has experienced tremendous growth and success during Perkins' short tenure.

• In the spring of 2008, the studentathletes in KU's 18-sport program achieved unprecedented success in the classroom. Eleven KU teams posted 3.0 grade-point

averages or better and 282 studentathletes on active rosters (58 percent) posted a 3.0 GPA or higher, including 58 with perfect 4.0 GPA's. Kansas studentathletes

earned a combined 3.03 grade-point

average during the 2008 spring semester, setting an Athletics Department-record for a spring semester.

- The football team won the 2008 Orange Bowl, capping a school-record 12-win season, and the team has been bowl-eligible in four of the last five years;
- The men's basketball team won the 2008 NCAA Men's Basketball Championship, reached the Elite Eight of the 2004 and 2007 NCAA Championships and has won

the last three Big 12 Conference regular-season championships, as well as the last two Big 12 tournament titles;

- The women's volleyball team has appeared in three NCAA tournaments, reaching the second round in 2003 and 2004;
- The women's soccer team has appeared in two NCAA tournaments, reaching the Sweet 16 in 2003;
- The softball team won the Big 12 Championship in 2006 and reached the NCAA tournament for the second straight season;
- The baseball team won the Big 12 Championship in 2006 and reached the NCAA tournament for the first time since 1994;
- The women's basketball team reached the 2008 and 2006 Women's National Invitation Tournament;
- \bullet Several track-and-field student-athletes have won NCAA titles, and many have received All-America and All-Big 12 honors.

Kansas Athletics fundraising has reached unprecedented levels. Under Perkins, KU's \$27-million athletics budget has grown to more than \$55 million. That fundraising, including landmark apparel and corporate-partner contracts, has resulted in greater services for KU coaches and student-athletes, and numerous upgrades in KU's athletics facilities:

- The Booth Family Hall of Athletics, which opened in January 2006 in Allen Fieldhouse, celebrates the tradition and history of Kansas Athletics; a beautiful Kansas
- Athletics Hall of Fame exhibit was unveiled in the Hall of Athletics in February 2008
- The spirit and aura of Allen Fieldhouse has been enhanced by renovations that were completed prior to the 2005-06 season and include freshly painted bleachers,

new windows, new lighting and sound systems, and a new center-hung scoreboard, which includes a large, state-of-the-art video board;

- The baseball complex now includes an indoor hitting facility and a new scoreboard, complete with a large, state-of-the-art video board;
- The Anderson Family Football Complex and two new practice fields adjacent to Kivisto Field at Memorial Stadium have recently been completed;
- A new Aquatic Rehabilitation Center houses three Hydroworx pools that enhance rehabilitation efforts under the guidance and supervision of the University of

Kansas Sports Medicine Staff.

Perkins has served on many NCAA, Big 12 Conference and other prestigious committees, including the Basketball Issues Committee. At the conference level,

Perkins has served as Chair of the Big 12 Board of Athletics Directors and as a member of the Big 12 Television Committee. In spring 2005 he was named to the Board of Directors of the Naismith Basketball Hall of Fame. Additionally, he is a member of the Gatorade Board of Directors.

At Connecticut (1990-2003), Perkins was instrumental in guiding UConn athletics to impressive growth - athletically, academically and financially. His leadership influenced six NCAA Division I National Championships.

He was rewarded in 2000 as the inaugural winner of the National Athletic Director of the Year Award as selected by Street & Smith's Sports Business Journal, in conjunction with the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA).

A native of Chelsea, Mass., Perkins was inducted into his high school Hall of Fame in 1989. A highly recruited basketball player, he played at the University of Iowa (1965-67) for Hall of Fame coach and KU graduate Ralph Miller. Perkins earned his undergraduate degree there in 1967.

Perkins served as Director of Athletics (1969-80) and head basketball coach (1969-79) at the University of South Carolina Aiken as that institution grew from a junior college to a four-year institution. He received his master's degree in education (1975) from the University of South Carolina. Perkins delivered the commencement address and received an honorary Doctor of Education degree at USC Aiken in May 2005. Perkins also has served as athletics director at the University of Maryland and Wichita State University, and associate director of athletics at the University of Pennsylvania.

Perkins is married to the former Gwen Flaum. Like Lew, Gwen earned an undergraduate degree from lowa and a master's degree in education from the University of South Carolina. They have two daughters - Amy (husband Brandon Macneill) and Holly - and two granddaughters (Caroline and Alexandra Macneill).

CHANCELLOR Dr. Robert Hemenway



Robert Hemenway's life has been marked by accomplishment as an administrator, teacher and scholar.

As the 16th chancellor of the University of Kansas, he is the chief executive of the university, which includes the main campus in Lawrence, the KU Medical Center in Kansas City, Kansas, the Edwards Campus in Overland Park and the School of Medicine-Wichita, along with facilities in Garden City, Hays, Parsons, Pittsburg, Topeka and Yoder.

Under Hemenway's leadership, a

growing number of KU academic programs have received national recognition, and the achievements of faculty and students have cemented KU's position as an international research university. U.S. News & World Report ranks 12 KU graduate programs in the top 10 nationwide and 26 in the top 25. KU's graduate programs in city management and urban policy and special education are ranked first in the nation.

KU enrolls more Kansans than any other university, with 70 percent of its more than 29,000 students coming from the Sunflower State. The diverse student body is highly talented, with an average ACT score well above the national average. KU students regularly win the nation's most prestigious awards, including Rhodes, Goldwater, Marshall, Fulbright, National Science Foundation and Udall scholarships. In intercollegiate competitions, KU students excel — the men's basketball team was the 2008 NCAA Champions, the debate team ranked first in the nation for the 2007-08 season, the journalism program was first in the Hearst writing competition and the football team was the victor in the 2008 Orange Bowl.

Research at KU, a major source of Kansas economic growth, has climbed steadily, reaching \$289 million in fiscal year 2007. The university's No. I research priority is to achieve National Cancer Institute designation for the KU Cancer Center at the KU Medical Center in Kansas City. This designation will lead to superior cancer research and care for citizens throughout the state and region.

As a public institution, KU remains focused on working for the people of Kansas. KU doctors treat patients throughout the state, during medical outreach trips and via telemedicine. KU researchers measure groundwater levels in western Kansas, while law enforcement officers trained by KU's Kansas Law Enforcement Training Center protect Kansans in every county.

Leaders of other universities recognize Hemenway's administrative talents. In November 2007, he was elected to the II-member executive committee for the Association of American Universities, an organization representing the nation's most prestigious research universities. He has also served on the board of directors for the American Council on Education, the National Association of State and Land Grant Colleges and the NCAA Division I Board

of Directors, which he chaired from 2002 to 2005.

Hemenway remains a committed scholar and teacher. He is known for his biography of African-American novelist Zora Neale Hurston, a "Best Books" pick by the New York Times in 1978 and a Quality Paperback Book Club selection in 1991. Hemenway also stays connected to the classroom, most recently teaching an honors seminar on global poverty.

Hemenway grew up in Hastings, Nebraska. Before becoming chancellor of KU, he served as chancellor of the University of Kentucky. Hemenway and his wife, Leah, live in the Outlook, the KU chancellor's official residence. Four of the chancellor's eight children are KU graduates. The Hemenways have seven grandchildren.

JAYHAWK TRADITIONS

THE ROCK CHALK CHANT

The Rock Chalk Chant has been the battle cry of KU fans for more than 80 years. This strange, traditional chant, which is among the most famous of all college cheers, was started by E.H.S. Bailey, a professor of chemistry. Bailey wanted a cheer for his Science Club. Returning from a convention in Wichita, Bailey and some associates patterned a yell after the rhythmic cadence of their train rolling along the tracks. On May 21, 1886, Bailey submitted the cheer to his club. Even though there was no football team at KU until 1890, the Rock Chalk Chant tradition steadily grew.

Before the University adopted the cheer in 1897, it consisted of "Rah, Rah, Jayhawk, KU" being repeated three times. An English professor soon suggested that "Rock Chalk" be substituted for "Rah, Rah" because it rhymed with Jayhawk. "Rock Chalk" was also symbolic of the chalky limestone formations found on Mount Oread. Professor Bailey would be amazed to hear 50,000 Jayhawk football fans shouting the cheer he gave his Science Club in 1886; a cheer that Teddy Roosevelt said was the best he had ever heard.







CAMPANILE HILL

Campanile Hill forms the picturesque backdrop for Memorial Stadium. On a sunny fall Saturday, the "Hill" is transformed into a congregating place for watching Jayhawk football, sunning and barbequing. Potter Lake, just to the southeast of Memorial Stadium and at the bottom of Campanile Hill, adds to the beauty of the Kansas campus.

WAYING THE WHEAT

Since the early days of KU football, it has been a ritual of Jayhawk fans to "wave the wheat" following every Kansas scoring drive. The ritual consists of fans waving their arms in the air, an activity which, when done by a large Memorial Stadium crowd, resembles a breezy Kansas wheat field.

THE NICKNAME

During the Civil War a regiment raised by Kansas Governor Charles Robinson called itself the "Independent Mounted Jayhawks" (later officially the First Kansas Calvary and then the Seventh Kansas Regiment). By the end of the Civil War the word Jayhawk was associated with the spirit of camaraderie and the courageous fighting qualities that characterized efforts to keep Kansas a free state.

By 1886, the University of Kansas had adopted the mythical bird as part of the KU yell. When the university's football team first took the field in 1890, it seemed only natural that they should be called Jayhawkers. Few colleges and universities have such a meaningful symbol, one so deeply associated with the struggles of the people who founded them.

THE FIGHT SONG

George "Dumpy" Bowles, a student with the class of 1912, longed to make a great contribution to KU spirit, but wasn't athletic enough to do historic deeds on the athletic field. He turned to music and produced some outstanding student musical shows.

A song in one of these shows was "I'm a Jayhawk." Written in 1912, it was dormant until 1920 when a growth in school spirit brought out "I'm a Jayhawk" once more. The song contributed to the raising of funds to build both the stadium and union as World War I memorials. The 1926 glee club made it known nationally.
